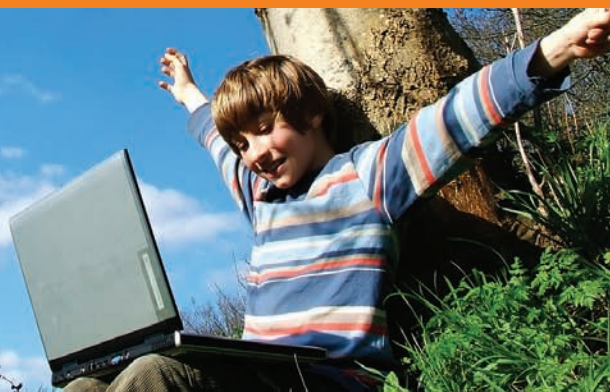

How Do Parents Get Their Children Started with Bookshare?

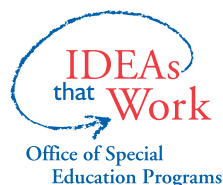
- Sign up for **Bookshare**: visit www.bookshare.org and select “Individual Membership” under “Sign Up Today!”
- Work with your child’s teacher to get **Bookshare at school**, so teachers can download school books, including textbooks! Have your school sign up at www.bookshare.org.
- **Request new books** your child may need for school assignments that are not yet in the library. Send an email to schoolbookrequest@bookshare.org.

Who Is Eligible for Bookshare?

Disability	Description	Examples of Certifying Professionals
Visual Impairment (VI)	Blind or low vision.	<p>School Affiliated: Teacher of the Visually Impaired Special Education teacher Learning disability specialist School psychologist Resource specialist</p> <p>Medical Professionals: Family doctor Ophthalmologist Optometrist Physical therapist Neurologist Psychiatrist Clinical psychologist</p> <p>Other Certification: Certification from the National Library Service</p>
Physical Disability (PD)	A disability that affects one’s ability to read print, such as the inability to hold a book or turn pages.	
Learning or Reading Disability (LD)	A specific language learning disability that significantly affects the ability to read printed material (typically for students who have an IEP).	



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
